## "Gowan Brae" Centenary – Sat 1<sup>st</sup> October 2016

*Gowan Brae* was built by Robert Easton in 1916 from timber milled on the property. It was a retirement home for his wife Isabella and himself, overlooking Burrell Creek and the creek flats and hills beyond. It is a most picturesque setting.

Robert and Isabella's daughter Beatrice and husband Jock Murray with baby son Elmo came to live and help with the home and property. Their children Bob, Kit and Bert



were born there, and Bob and Bert stayed on to manage the property, which they did for many years. Family and friends always enjoyed horse rides, patting the lambs, and observing the animals and birds on the property, as well as sharing a yarn and tales of the “old days”.

The home has been the focus for many happy family occasions: dances, music, bonfires, school visits, and both Murray Clan and Easton-Paterson gatherings. It is eminently suitable for such occasions, with its enormous verandah overlooking the lush green valley below and so much of its history having been lovingly preserved for so long by Bob and Bert, and more recently, Raymond and Rosemary.

Sadly Ray did not get to see his vision for the place fulfilled, as he passed away in 2007. Rosemary decided to carry on with the help of family and friends, all of whom came together to celebrate *Gowan Brae*'s centenary year.

Rosemary thanked all those who had an association with the house over the years and those who had helped to conserve and restore the heritage of the property. Ross Murray and Warwick Murray spoke on behalf of the Murray Clan and Philip Paterson for the Paterson-Easton Association, after which Rosemary and Ray's grandchildren cut the cake, looking towards the future.

All were invited to view the house, watch the slide show of the working parties involved and enjoy the many photo albums tracing the history and characters involved with the property over the years.

## Passing of Tom Cornall

We were saddened on 12<sup>th</sup> May with the passing of Tom Cornall of Bunyah at the age of 86. Tom had been a great supporter of the Murray Clan Society since its inception, attending virtually every annual gathering. Tom's late wife Margaret was a grand-daughter of Hugh Murray, who migrated to Australia from Scotland on the *Castle Eden* in 1848.

Tom farmed the property at Bunyah that was originally taken up as a soldier settlement block by his grandfather after the First World War. He was an accomplished rodeo rider in his early days and loved dancing, an activity he continued to enjoy throughout his life.

Tom served 25 years in the Army Reserve. At his funeral, tribute was paid to his Army service by Del Heuke, an ex RAAF nurse and long term local RSL volunteer who is a life member of the NSW RSL.

Tom was a fine gentleman and will be sadly missed by his family and friends. In later life, Tom enjoyed many years of companionship with Alma Murray. To Alma and to Tom's sons Darrin and Brendan and their families we extend our sincere condolences.

Tom's funeral was held at the Dyers Crossing Anglican Church prior to his interment at Krambach Cemetery. Murray Clan Commissioner Warwick Murray spoke on behalf of the Clan and Rob Gow, well known to many local Murrays, played two bagpipe solos.

## Camphouse

Many members would know that *Camphouse* at Killawarra was one of the original Murray properties on the Manning, having been taken up by Thomas Murray. The property has been the scene of many Murray Clan gatherings and features a cemetery in which several of the early Murrays are buried.

The property is currently owned by Mr Dave King of Castlereagh. Mr King is distantly linked to the Murrays through the Moore family and the property is being well cared for. In particular, new fencing has been erected around the historic cemetery and the homestead is being maintained, although it is unoccupied.

I hope this email finds you all well.

**Fri 4<sup>th</sup> August 2017**

This is a unique opportunity to join us at the Royal Edinburgh Military Tattoo. The evening is especially dedicated to the Murray Clan and we will join Michael Tullibardine and a strong contingent of Atholl Highlanders who will march onto the esplanade with full pipes, drums, and regimental colours for a short ceremony with some interesting VIPs before taking seats.

For those of you who are not familiar with The Tattoo it is the headline event of the Edinburgh Festival each August. It takes place on the esplanade in front of Edinburgh Castle which must be one of the most iconic settings in the world. It has a cast of 1,200 performers from all over the world including massed pipe bands and other theatrical and military performances. There is also a stunning lighting display and fireworks. This will be one of 25 shows running throughout August – each one dedicated to specific clans. There is an audience of 8,000 each night and the TV coverage has a global audience of 100 million people.

We have already bought some £35 Tattoo tickets in Stand 16 Rows G-H in the name of the Murray Clan Society for redistribution but, if you are able, we would urge you buy your online tickets or through the ticket office directly... this is the online purchasing link: [www.edintattoo.co.uk](http://www.edintattoo.co.uk) with password 'ARTHUR 20' for our clan seating or call the box office on +44 (0)131 225 1188 if buying over 8 tickets: the remaining £35 tickets are in Stand 16 Rows M-CC plus there are still £47, £52, £74, and £125 tickets available.

We have also booked balcony rooms in the New Club on Princes Street for our clan members and associates to rendezvous prior to the event and we will take this opportunity to formally reactivate the long-dormant Murray Clan Society (UK) – more details on this to come... if you would like to join us please let me know for numbers and I will keep you posted. NB we may ask for a modest contribution to venue hire and refreshments on the day.

We hope that representatives from as many branches of the clan and septs from across the world as possible can join us.

"No way. Not on your life. Not if I'm going to have to explain it three times!"

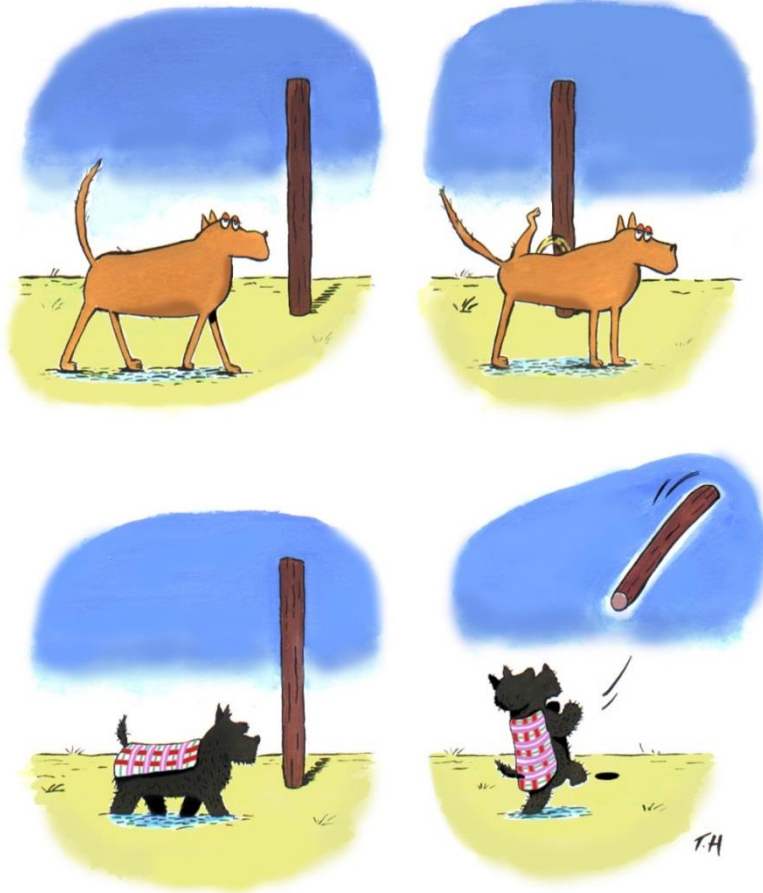
